

Bishop Libasci's Thanksgiving Message 2016

November 24, 2016

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,
Thanksgiving Day was inaugurated as, and remains, a
secular national holiday that not only allows but
expects us, as citizens, to bow our heads in prayer.
This gesture of humility demonstrates our reliance on
and gratitude for the gifts of Almighty God whose
hand created and guides the unfolding course of life.
Thanksgiving remains a day of national reverence on
which we, as citizens, are not only allowed but
expected to be generous to the poor and welcoming to
the stranger among us. It is a day that not only allows
but encourages us as citizens to respond to Jesus' two
Great Commandments: to love God with all our heart,
mind, soul and strength and to love our neighbor as
ourselves.

At its heart our nation can be a holy nation; a people set apart. We can be the beacon that shines on a hill; indeed, many times we do stand as a shining example. We have the resources and the capacity to bow our heads with a nobility that reflects the very best of who we are and what we represent. Therefore we ought to take this Thanksgiving Day to commit ourselves to this image of our best selves as citizens.

My prayer for this cause is taken from a very beautiful Jewish prayer, a people who were directed by God to remember the poor and the alien by recalling that they too were once strangers in a foreign land:



What significance does the Advent season have for our Christian faith journey?



Advent is a season of joyful anticipation and expectation. But for what specifically? Certainly not for the birth of the Christ Child—that occurred more than two thousand years ago. This season links us with all those who lived in the era of longing for the coming of the Messiah. But he has come and lived among us.

Then what are we joyfully anticipating and expecting?

Some are joyfully anticipating the many gifts that they will buy and share with others, along with the many gifts they will receive in return. Others enter into the overblown commercialism—decorating, partying, writing cards, and all the endless customs that go with the season.

What if the anticipation and expectation were to focus on how we can continue to make present the living Christ in each and every moment of our daily lives? Yes, Jesus came among us two thousand years ago. But how do we continue to make that presence real in our world? Jesus himself set the agenda for us. We are to proclaim good news to the poor, liberty to captives, sight to the blind, provide food for the hungry, shelter for the homeless, freedom for those who are oppressed and abused. What would the Advent season look like if this, rather than materialism, was the main focus of our joyful anticipation and expectation? Try it and see what results. It may surprise all of us.
